The documentary features Indiana farmerleader Mark Seib, as well as Sean Duffy with the Big River Coalition, Paul Aucoin with the Port of South Louisiana and Captain Michael Miller with Associated Branch Pilots.

Each stakeholder in the project discusses how various industries and our economy overall benefit from deepening a 256-mile stretch of the river from 45 feet to 50 feet. USB funded crucial research, planning and design that made the dredging project possible. The documentary tells this story to

executives and decision-makers in various river-dependent industries, aiming to pave the way for future success by the agriculture industry and others.

1-POTATO, 2-POTATO, SOY-WEET POTATO PIE!

Believe it or not, it's time to talk Thanksgiving menus. Holiday plans might be different this year, but that doesn't mean our food has to be! Try this Thanksgiving classic with a twist, Soy Sweet Potato Pie made with soymilk.

INGREDIENTS

- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 2 large eggs
- 1¾ cup cooked and mashed sweet potatoes
- 12 ounces soymilk

- 1 unbaked 9-inch deep-dish pie shell
- Whipped cream (optional)



INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Start by mixing the sugar, cinnamon, salt, ginger and cloves in small bowl.
- 2. Add eggs to a separate, larger bowl and beat.
- 3. Stir in the sweet potatoes and sugar-spice mixture, then gradually stir in the soymilk.
- 4. Pour the mixture into the unbaked pie shell and bake in a pre-heated oven at 425°F for 15 minutes.
- 5. Reduce the temperature to 350°F and bake another 40 to 50 minutes or until a knife inserted near the center comes out clean.
- 6. Cool on a wire rack for 2 hours.
- 7. Serve immediately or refrigerate.
- 8. Top with whipped cream before serving.
